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Presentation of the preparatory colloquium of Verona

The topic of the XIX International Congress of the International Association of Penal Law is **Information Society and Penal Law.**

The conference is divided into four sections about: substantive criminal law - general part; substantive criminal law - special part; criminal procedure; international law.

Each section is based on a preparatory colloquium. The Rapporteur General, who prepared the questionnaire approved by the governing bodies of AIDP-IAPL, receives the National Reports of the national groups and presents the General Report. After the discussion about its contents involving the National Rapporteurs and all participants at the colloquium, he formulates a draft resolution, which is approved and published on the Revue Internationale de Droit Pénal. This draft resolution will be discussed in details during the corresponding section of the International Conference and may be amended until the final approval by the general assembly of the International Conference.

Other preparatory colloquia for the International Conference of 2014 will take place in Russia (II Section: Moscow, 24-27 April 2013), Turkey (III Section: Antalya, 23-26 September 2013) and in Finland (IV Section: Helsinki, 10-12 June 2013).

We are honored that the **first preparatory colloquium** will take place at the **Faculty of Law of the University of Verona**, Italy, from 28th to 30th November 2012.

The first day (Wed. 28 Nov.) will be open to the public and will be focused on "ICT, cybercrime and computer forensics in the information society". After the opening session and the introduction of Prof. Antonino Gullo, Secretary of State of the Ministry of Justice of Italy, representing also Prof. Paola Severino, Ministry of Justice and member of IAPL, representatives of academic, law enforcement, lawyers and private industries operating in the ICT sector will participate at the round table.

The participants at the round table will discuss, from their point of view, at theoretical and practical level, the most actual and important topics posed by the informatization, with regard to the needs and the fight strategy against the crime in the global society.

Thursday 29 Nov. and Friday 30 Nov. will be focused on the presentation by the General Rapporteurs, prof. Thomas Weigend, University of Köln, Germany of his General Report and later on the discussion also of the proposal of the resolution for the first section of the XIX international conference.

Presentation of the topic of the first section

To an extent that was hardly foreseeable even 30 years ago, social life on a worldwide scale depends on the proper functioning of information and communication technology (ICT) and the internet. This dependence extends to both the public and the private spheres. On an individual level, interpersonal communication, but also large parts of leisure activity including information-gathering are ICT-based, and many individuals have heavily invested in the development and maintenance of their digital personality (or personalities), e.g. in personal websites, social network and media (such as Facebook and Twitter) and blogs.

The existence of a worldwide web and the possibilities of computer technology enable persons with criminal intentions to cause maximal harm with minimal effort.

Hacking and data falsification, attacks on the integrity of ICT, violations of the privacy, attacks to the security of systems and data, "identity theft" on the internet, Intellectual Property infringements, incitement to racism and xenophobia, system and data interference, illegal interception of non-public transmissions of computer data are increasing

More in general new communication tools are also useful for the preparation of serious and traditional crimes (such as fraud, terrorism etc.) are threatening the well-being not only of individuals but also of business firms and States and can affect security and the economic system as a whole.

Other features of ICT further contribute to the attractiveness of the net for criminal assaults on individual or collective interests. The possibility of acting anonymously and of using a false identity enables criminals to remain undetected. Detection is further complicated by the extremely high speed of data transfer coupled with routine deletion of transfer data by service providers. The origins of the worldwide web as a device for the quick transfer of secret military information further contribute to the shielding of network users from detection: the worldwide web was purposely devised as a network with many overlapping and independent

lines of communication, thus making the web resistant to any attempt of disturbing its functioning through external intervention. The web structure also makes it highly difficult to trace individual items of information back to one source or to effectively block access to information.

In the fight against new forms of cybercrime and traditional crimes, in which the Internet and new technologies are just the instrument to commit criminal activities, the fundamental question is: what role should have the penal law?

The questions in this section generally deal with "**cybercrime**" and, more in general, the criminal activities in Internet. This term is understood to cover criminal conduct that affects interests associated with the use of ICT, such as the proper functioning of computer systems and the Internet, the privacy and integrity of data stored or transferred in or through ICT, or the virtual identity of internet users.

The common denominator and characteristic feature of all cybercrime offences and cybercrime investigation can be found in their relation to computer systems, computer networks and computer data on the one hand and to cyber systems, social networks and data on the other hand. Cybercrime covers offenses concerning traditional computers as well as cloud computing and cyber databases.
